Perhaps more important, I can't help but think about the question "What role, if any, should the local church play in helping the Carols of this world?" and how that question should be answered by us.

After all, this church and many others like it have limited financial resources and can't afford to "adopt" several supposedly down-and-out adults for the holidays, let alone the rest of the year. On

the other hand, Jesus calls us in Matthew 25 to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, look after the sick, etc., etc.

When I last encountered Carol in our parking lot (Sunday, October 16), she wanted some money to buy some medicine at Walmart. Or so she said. And when I didn't immediately whip out a Lincoln, a Hamilton or a Jackson to help her out, she proceeded to put a little more psychological pressure on me by saying "I'm a Christian!"

Another congregant offered to accompany Carol to Walmart and purchase the medicine for her. She refused this generous offer.

So what's a fellow (or lady) to do? Well, at one time (and perhaps it's still the case) the pastor of our church was authorized to give up to \$50 in cash to someone in need of money, but that would require the individual who wants the money to actually have some interaction with the pastor during his or her regular office hours. That's easily hoped for, of course, but it's not all that likely to happen, right?

Might I suggest that to assist the Carols of this world from time to time, the church think about acquiring some gift cards (I'm specifically thinking of places that don't sell liquor, tobacco or firearms) that could be handed out in the parking lot by designated congregants entrusted with this task. What do you think? I'd love to hear from you regarding this difficult but recurring subject.

The well-known Christmas favorites the assembled musicians will be performing include "Silent Night," "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear," "What Child Is This," "The First Noel," "Away in a Manger," and "We Wish You a Merry Christmas."

The concert will open with a brass quartet arrangement of "Deck the Halls" featuring Nicholas, Nathan, Peter and Ben Proctor. Next, Freda will hook up with Riley and Sarah Proctor on a flute trio arrangement of "It Came Upon a Midnight Clear." Later, Nicholas will play "Stille Nacht" (Silent Night) on the trumpet, Jordan Proctor "What Child Is This" on her cello, and Ben "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas" on his trombone.

The proverbial spotlight of attention will be directed at the Bell Choir when it performs "Silent Night," "Carol of the Bells," "Away in a Manger," and "Ding Dong Merrily on High."

The talents of members of the First City Flute Choir will be showcased on Tchaikovsky's "Danse des Mirlitons" from the Nutcracker Suite, a medley of French carols ("He Is Born," "Pat-a-pan" and "Angels We Have Heard on High"), "Fum, Fum, Fum," "The First Noel," "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen," "The Holly and the Ivy," and "We Wish You a Merry Christmas."
